Martin was once a service user. He came to us when he was homeless and used the Winter Night Shelter during the freezing cold nights of a bleak December. What Martin said is so telling:

“ I couldn’t believe all these people were being nice to me.”

Martin had experienced many difficulties in his life and not a lot of help.

The kindness and professional support he received from our staff and volunteers was instrumental in him being empowered to turn his life around.

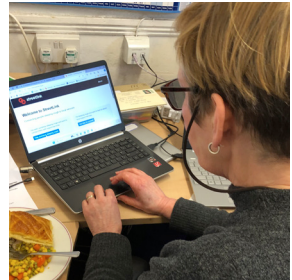

MAREK had lived in the UK for over ten years. He came to the Drop-In after sleeping on the street for two weeks.

Due to ill-health **Marek** had lost his job and was unable to pay his rent. His landlord changed the locks and refused to let him re-enter his home to collect his belongings, essential documents and paperwork.

Marek came to the Drop-In physically unwell, suffering from a hernia and he had no GP. He was welcomed and assessed and one of our project workers supported him to register with a local surgery where he received medical attention. The project worker applied and got an HC1 certificate for him which enabled him to get the prescription glasses he needed.

He also negotiated with Marek's landlord and made arrangements for him to collect his belongings. With his identification documents retrieved, Marek was supported to apply for the benefits he was entitled to. With this in place, FIA was able to place him in affordable accommodation with a private landlord.

Marek is now taking care of himself and his physical health issues are being treated. He is keen to return to work as soon as his health has improved.

The Drop-In staff listened to **Jacob's** story and immediately referred him to the Merton Winter Night Shelter. Here he found a safe place to stay during the night, with food and support in tackling his alcohol problem. He successfully completed detoxification from his addiction but needed stability to aid his recovery. The staff at the Drop-in helped Jacob move to a supported housing scheme. They worked jointly with a local drug and alcohol service to support Jacob throughout the Covid lockdown. Three years later, Jacob is living independently and has been volunteering in a local community kitchen for the last five years.

Serena is a European national who has been living and working in the UK for over ten years. When she reappeared at the Drop-In it was clear that she was suffering mental ill-health and was sleeping rough. She was friendly but extremely guarded.

Serena started attending regularly and slowly we began to build trust between us. One defining moment happened when the bicycle she used to transport her belongings was damaged. She was taken to a local bicycle repair shop where her bike was duly condemned as unsafe. But on learning her situation the shop owner very generously produced an almost identical bike and sold it to us at cost. It took a while for her to understand that it was now hers but when she did, her face lit up with delight.

The mental health nurse who, along with the Council outreach worker, regularly attends FIA confirmed that she had been detained under the Mental Health Act in the past. The council worker was able to accept this and immediately placed her in temporary accommodation where she remains today. When she pops back to see us she tells us that she 'loves' her accommodation. She is being supported to apply for identification documents and to claim the benefits she may be entitled to.

About Faith in Action

Our Vision

To empower and be instrumental in transforming the lives of people in London Borough of Merton and the neighbouring boroughs who are experiencing homelessness, are vulnerably housed or socially excluded from the community.

Our Purpose

To provide support, information and help for anyone experiencing homelessness, is vulnerably housed or socially excluded from the community. We particularly focus on those who are 'hard to reach' because of addiction issues, mental ill-health, challenging behaviours or other difficulties.

We also provide support where there appears to be a gap in service provision or where they are not able to access the services due to their situation.

We aim to reduce the risk of harm to our service user guests and improve their well-being. We encourage them to set realistic goals to break the cycle and we then support them to achieve those goals.

- **Gain employment**
- **Access benefits**

What we do

Homeless Drop-In

Every Wednesday and Friday between 10am to 2:30pm at the Salvation Army Hall, 109 Kingston Road, Wimbledon SW19 1LT.

Rough sleepers have priority during the morning where they receive a friendly welcome with a smile. There is access to unlimited hot drinks, breakfast and a nutritious freshly-cooked two course lunch. There are shower and laundry services, second-hand clothes, a postal address (many use this as their contact address), phone charging, English classes and internet access.

Our staff work individually with service users, helping in a variety of ways – opening bank HSBC accounts using their No Fixed Abode service and applying for citizen cards for photo ID.

Winter Night Shelter

This takes place in various faith group halls, generally run by volunteers from the same organisation. In several cases, faith groups were able to offer their venue or a volunteer team but not both, so we marry up the two.

This is yet another example of the wonderful collaboration between our various partners.

Who are we?

Reflecting on the past year at FIA, I am humbled by the resilience and dedication displayed by our staff team, supporters, volunteers and not least our service users and guests. The current environment is challenging for charities, but despite facing increasing demands and financial constraints, FIA remains committed to providing essential services for homeless and vulnerably-housed people.

This could only be achieved in 2023/24 by further draining our now seriously-depleted reserves. We are working hard to increase our income to cover the additional costs and demands.

2023 was a particularly challenging year, with two changes of Project Manager.

Grace joined in December and has quickly settled in and made a tremendously positive impact. She and her team continue to push the boundaries of what can be done to support our service users and, more importantly, to support their journey back to mainstream society.

The Merton Winter Night Shelter operated for fourteen weeks through the coldest period of the year, and achieved some success in finding permanent accommodation for its guests. However, the environment in which we operate has been noticeably more challenging than previously.

As Chair of the Board of Trustees, I am grateful to everyone who has contributed to our success over the past year. Your continued support, particularly our donors and volunteers, enables us to continue our vital work, offering respite and tangible help to many vulnerable people.

FIA does some truly amazing work with some incredibly complex and challenging people – our service users. However, we can improve.
